Our House Teams

McAuley

Our red house team is McAuley. It's named after Catherine McAuley, the Irish lady who started the Sisters of Mercy. She needed the Sisters to help her to teach the poor and nurse the sick. Catherine inspired the work of the Mercy Sisters who opened Holy Rosary School. Catherine said, "We should be shining lamps giving light to those around us." These words inspired our school song and we continue to wear the Mercy Cross on our uniform. The very first principal of HR was Sister Clare Daly who began in 1916.

Sion

Sion House, our green team, is named after the Sisters of Sion who were at Holy Rosary for a period of time. The Sisters started their work teaching in France and they first came to Australia in 1890. The Sisters of Sion define themselves as "women who help to heal a fractured world". They are well known for instilling a tradition of welcome and inclusion; important values for us at HR.

MacKillop

MacKillop House is our blue team, and it reminds us of Mary MacKillop. Mary was born in Melbourne and was baptised at St Francis Church in the city. She had a calling from God to teach the poorest and most remote children in Australia. To help her important work, Mary established the Sisters of St Joseph, often called the Joeys. Mary became famous for her words, "Never see a need without doing something about it." Her words remind us all to take action to help those who need us. Mary's work was very challenging and she inspires us to be resilient and to act with integrity, even when things are very tough. Mary of the Cross MacKillop became Australia's first saint.

Hennessy

Our yellow house team is Hennessy, in honour of Holy Rosary's first Parish Priest, Father Aeneas Francis Hennessy who was born in 1860. Holy Rosary Church was first opened in Derby St in 1902 but it didn't become a Parish until 1915. That's when Father Hennessy left Lilydale and became Holy Rosary's first Parish Priest. He lived in Derby Street and moved to Gower Street in 1919. The church was later demolished, and a new church opened, where it is now, in Gower Street in 1928. Fr Hennessy died in 1932 and is buried at the Melbourne Cemetery.

Uniform

We ask you to please work with us to ensure your children are wearing the correct uniform. We will be focusing on uniform as a part of our PBL in coming weeks. The uniform expectations can be found on our website and are part of our enrolment policy signed by families.

At this time we are focusing on-

- Hair- shoulder length hair must be tied back
- Jewellery is restricted to small studs or sleepers and watches. Bracelets, although all the rage at the moment, are not part of our uniform.
- Nail polish is not to be worn.
- Socks should be navy or white without brands or logos
- Hats should be in good condition. Frayed hats need to be replaced.

Front Gate

The duty teacher arrives at 8:30am and children and families are welcome to be onsite after this time. If families require an earlier start, children must attend <u>TeamKids</u>. Lately, we have a number of children arriving early and waiting unsupervised. This is neither safe nor acceptable. An accident can happen in the blink of an eye.

Early leave sign out/Late to sign on iPad

If your child is late or you are picking them up early, you must sign them in/out on the iPad in the office. This must be done by a parent/carer/emergency contact person, including a signature and a photo. Students are not permitted to sign themselves in or out. The easiest way to manage this process is to arrive at school by 8:50am and depart at 3:15pm.

NAPLAN 2024

It's NAPLAN week! The testing window starts this Wednesday and concludes on Monday 25 March.



Our timetable for the children sitting the Naplan tests is as follows:

Wednesday 13 March: Writing Thursday 14 March: Reading

Friday 15 March: Language Conventions

Monday 18 March: Numeracy

All tests in each of the subject areas, for both Year 3 and Year 5 students, will begin at 9:30am.

If your child has expressed any anxiety relating to NAPLAN tests, please alert your child's teacher.

Helpful Hints for Parents and children during NAPLAN week

- 1. **Encourage confidence**: your child will do well when they feel that 'giving the tests their best shot' is all that you expect.
- **2. Discuss feelings and concerns:** Feeling a little anxious is normal, show empathy and listen to fears. Perhaps share times when you have felt this way before tests when you went to school.
- **3. Maintain a positive attitude:** Continue to be approachable and encourage interest in their usual after school activities. This allows children to feel safe and secure.
- **4. Prepare your child:** Have them go to bed early, have breakfast, have a bottle of water and a **nutritious** lunch/ snacks prepared.
- 5. Arrive at school on time.
- **6. Keep Perspective:** This is a series of tests in time; just one form of assessment: success is not determined by these tests.

Direct any questions you may have regarding NAPLAN to your child's class teacher. Maria is also on hand to speak to you, should you have queries.

Harmony Day 2024

Holy Rosary will celebrate Harmony Day on Thursday the 21st of March. Students can wear orange (or just a splash) as this is the colour of harmony. The theme is *Everyone Belongs* and students will participate in activities throughout the day to learn more about living in harmony.

Each week we feature learning from around our classrooms. Here's a look inside the Prep rooms!

Literacy

Our learning in these early weeks has focused on the letters of the alphabet and the different sounds they make. We have enjoyed going on letter hunts and identifying the corresponding sounds to build words. We are learning about the structure of sentences to create our own.









Maths

We have been looking at different ways numbers can be displayed and learning how to recognise them quickly. We have been practising writing numbers, counting forwards and backwards, and playing number games with one another.

Inquiry

We have been learning about friendship and fairness. The Preps have spoken about what makes a good friend and what we look for when we want to make friends. We have completed activities that require us to be fair, follow the rules and share with our friends.

Religion

We have been learning about Jesus and some of the events that happened in the lead up to Easter. Students have been working hard to create their piece for the *Journey to Jerusalem: Artscape*, which will be displayed in the Church next week in preparation for Holy Week.

Line Up procedure

We are currently focusing on children lining up respectfully and responsibly. Part of this procedure is children lining up in alphabetical order. We are teaching the children to place their bag in their correct spot on the white line as they arrive at school. This means they can play and return to their correct spot when they hear the bell. In order to maintain a successful morning transition and foster independence, it is important for you to give your child a hug and leave them to do the rest.



Children may come dressed in their pyjamas from home on Tuesday. They should wear sturdy shoes/slippers for outdoor play and pyjamas must cover shoulders.

Wellbeing

At Holy Rosary School all children and families are expected to be Wellbeing Warriors who look after the safety and wellbeing of themselves and others

Mental health literacy refers to a person's knowledge and beliefs about mental disorders, which aid their recognition, management and prevention. Ideally, we would all have the same mental health literacy, so there is a shared understanding in our community to help us all recognise, manage and prevent mental health concerns amongst our children. The Mental Health in Primary School (MHiPS) project aims to help us build capacity throughout our community (teachers, students and parents) so that we can all use and understand a shared language.

There are a variety of words that you will have heard and used to talk about mental health concerns. These may include mental health issues, difficulties, challenges and disorders. At Holy Rosary we will refer to these as *mental health concerns* and *mental health conditions*.

Mental Health Concerns, refer to concerns regarding a student's emotional, psychological, or behavioural wellbeing that may be causing distress or interfering with their daily functioning. Concerns are often situational and may arise in response to specific life events, changes or stressors. All children will fluctuate along the continuum of mental health - from 'good' to 'overwhelmed' and may need support at different times. Early identification and intervention of mental health concerns can help prevent them from developing into more serious mental health conditions later in life.

This mental health continuum is used to track mental health over a period of time.



Mental Health Conditions are diagnosed by a health professional. Examples of mental health conditions include depression, anxiety disorders, and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder. Mental health conditions can cause significant interference with cognitive, emotional and/or social functioning and often require intervention and treatment. Children with a diagnosed mental health condition can move along the continuum, just like any other child.

Each week we will endeavour to provide information about mental health and wellbeing as a way to build our school communities capacity to better understand, manage and prevent mental health concerns in our children.

Stop 2: Identify examples and non-examples of the desired behaviour


