Reconciliation



On Tuesday 26 March at 1pm, some of our Year 3 students will celebrate their First Reconciliation at Holy Rosary Church. This important sacrament marks a significant step in their spiritual journey, and emphasises the values of self reflection, forgiveness and growth. As a school community, we support and encourage these students on their faith journey.

Journey to Jerusalem Artscape

The Stations of the Cross depict Jesus Christ's journey on the day of his crucifixion. Stations of the Cross feature prominently in Western Christian churches, often displayed as paintings, carvings or statues. The stations are based on the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem symbolising the route that Jesus took to Mount Calvary, where he was crucified. The Journey to Jerusalem is Holy Rosary's 'Stations of the Cross' designed to enable students, families and parishioners to recall Jesus' journey and apply it to a modern context.

This year we will present the Journey to Jerusalem as an artscape, using photography. Each class has read, analysed and discussed the themes presented in scripture. From there, they have reconceptualised the chosen scripture in a modern context before capturing it in a photo.

These artworks will be displayed in the church for the Holy Rosary community to view before and during Easter. Accompanying each photograph is a title, prayer and student wonderings. Our classes have created some exceptional pieces of art and we highly recommend you viewing them.

Our students will begin visiting the artscape from Wednesday 20th March. Families are welcome to view *Journey to Jerusalem* on;

Holy Rosary School will write one reference for any student who is applying for enrolment or a scholarship in a secondary school.

- 1. Please forward your request to the principal (<u>cshaw@hrkensington.catholic.edu.au</u>) with a bullet list of extra curricular activities your child has participated in/currently participates in and any significant achievements. This may include Science Fair, piano lessons, Speech and Drama, swimming and athletics, sacraments, parish involvement, and sports.
- 2. Provide the name of the person to whom the letter will be addressed, their role, and email address.
- 3. I will ask your child's current and previous teachers for any further information including academic and social/emotional strengths. This information will be included in the reference which will then be emailed to the school.

New Tables

True North

<u>True North</u> is a program from <u>North Melbourne Football Club</u> that the Year 5/6 students participated in and learnt different skills like grit, teamwork, leadership and growth mindset. We did many different activities to improve our abilities and our weaknesses.

Each week we covered a different topic;

Grit - Grit is perseverance and passion for achieving long-term goals. In this lesson we used Sphero (robots) and we built courses for the Sphero to race on.

Teamwork- teamwork is when we work as a team. In this lesson we used Lego to build a giant tower and we learned how to talk to one another effectively.

Leadership- leadership is when you step forward to help lead a team. In this lesson we learnt that there is more to being a leader than just bossing people around. We learnt that everybody should have a voice. **Growth Mindset** - a growth mindset is when you use positive self talk to keep you going. We wrote our name on a piece of paper and people would compliment you.

We really enjoyed True North and learnt a lot about ourselves.

Wellbeing

At Holy Rosary School all children and families are expected to be Wellbeing Warriors who look after the safety and wellbeing of themselves and others

Child Development and Mental Health

The foundation for a child's mental health and wellbeing are laid early in their lives and are shaped by the experiences they have and the people around them. These experiences and people can help to shape good mental health and wellbeing, or disrupt it. Children's social, emotional and cognitive development can be shaped by what is going on in their lives as well as the positive or negative impacts from people such as family, carers, teachers and peers. This video gives a great explanation of the impacts of early experiences on the brain - Brain Builders on Vimeo


It can be difficult to determine whether a child is experiencing mental health and wellbeing concerns that are age appropriate or actual concerns that we need to work to manage, or may need professional support.

In terms of childhood development, here are some things that are age appropriate in relation to cognitive and psychosocial development. This information helps adults to determine what to expect and what to look out for.

- Children's cognitive skills develop. For example, they develop the capacity for understanding different perspectives.
- Children's capacity to direct and sustain their attention develops significantly.
- Short-term and long-term memory develops significantly.
- Children are developing skills in interpreting cues in conversations, such as waiting for their turn to speak.
- Children's capacity to understand others' feelings develops.
- Children become more sociable and prefer to play with friends rather than on their own. Children may demonstrate a preference to play more with children of the same gender.
- Children's play becomes more complex. In the early primary years, children may have difficulty with sharing and games with rules. In the later years, children can typically cope better with playing fair, winning and losing, and the rules of games.
- In the early school years, children can express their feelings with more ease but identifying and talking about tricky emotions such as frustration or jealousy might still be difficult.
- Children have better control of their emotions and may have fewer outbursts of anger or sadness.
- Self-esteem tends to be more realistic in early primary school. As they get older, children begin to compare themselves with peers, which begins to influence their self-esteem.

Just remember that these are all skills that develop between the ages of six to twelve, so in younger children these will be less developed.

What To Say

What To Say is a lovely story from Davina Bell and Hilary Jean Tapper. Written for children, it provides them with the words to say during difficult and emotionally challenging times. Whether it be moving house, losing a loved one or fighting with a friend, this book can help your child know what to say and how to deal with some big feelings. We have a copy of this in our library if you'd like to borrow it.

WHAT'S BEEN GOING ON IN MUSIC...

This term's Music focus is on the *Elements of Music* and *Instruments from the Orchestra*. Below is a summary of what each year level has experienced:

YEAR 5/6

Using their knowledge of the elements of Music (Melody, Dynamics, Harmony, Tempo and Timbre), the year 5/6 students used the video editing website "ClipChamp" to create sound effects for a short animation. Students had to think creatively and used different instruments and natural resources to create the sound effects. They have just finished their projects this week, and I look forward to viewing their final results.

YEAR 3/4

Our year 3/4 students had the chance to explore different instruments from the four instrument families (string, brass, percussion and wind) in recent Music lessons. They tried to blow sounds on the flute, plucked the strings of a violin, played with tambourines and also pressed the keys on a trumpet. Students will now move on to a research project where they use 'Canva for education' to create a poster about one instrument of their choice. Year 3/4 students are also practising how to identify the different elements of music in songs and instrumental pieces, and how these elements generate meaning and mood.

YEAR 1/2

Students have been focusing on Tempo and Melody this term. The year 1/2 students were given opportunities to practise improvising a melody and beat. Many students went out of their comfort zone to sing and play in front of their teachers and peers, and some were even able to improvise a melody alongside a backing track! Students will now move on to learning about the four instrument families, and how instruments from each family differ in sound, make and sizes.

PREP


We have been building the beginning blocks of Music with our prep students by teaching them what the five different elements of Music are. Students have been singing songs, playing boomwhackers and using chrome music lab to create their own melodies, harmonies and rhythms. Students are also learning how to use instruments safely and responsibly in a group setting, and how to collaborate with others to create music.

CHOIR AND BAND

Our Holy Rosary Choir has started their first rehearsal! We are starting off with the classic song "You raise me up", and they were already sounding amazing in their first rehearsal. Now that we have band members confirmed, we will also start rehearsals next week. Look forward to the performances that will start arising next term for both band and choir!
