#### **Flourishing Learners**

Maria and I attended the launch of the MACS Flourishing Learners position paper last Thursday evening. This is a plan for the MACS system wide implementation of evidence based best practice in every school. In summary, it is based on explicit teaching, formative assessment and regular review within a multi-tiered system of support. It is not, as reported in the media based on rote learning or direct instruction. Sarah, Maria and I will attend the initial professional learning session at Moonee Valley this week. As Holy Rosary is already fluent in the planning and implementation of explicit teaching we envisage a smooth and gradual transition to even stronger teaching practices. Stay tuned for further information which we will share after our first professional learning session.

#### <u>NAPLAN 2024</u>



The NAPLAN test window for 2024 is open from Wednesday 13 March - Monday 25 March.

Some children experience anxiety around these tests. We ask that if your child expresses or experiences any concerns, please let your child's teacher know.

They will ensure extra care is taken to alleviate these feelings.

#### We will follow the timetable as set by the VCAA as outlined:

Wednesday 13 March:WritingThursday 14 March :ReadingFriday 15 March:Language ConventionsMonday 18 March:Numeracy

All tests in each of the subject areas, for both Year 3 and Year 5 students, will begin at 9:30am.

The <u>VCAA</u> has stipulated that any make up tests for writing must be completed by Friday 15 March. We will make provision for this in our schedule.

In addition we have set aside Tuesday 19 March - Monday 25 March as our 'catch-up' days for any other tests also beginning at 9:30am. These catch-up sessions are for children who were absent during the scheduled first week timetable.

The VCAA has produced a brochure for parents answering frequently asked questions. Click on this <u>link</u> to access the brochure. Any further questions can be directed to your child's classroom teacher or Maria.

We have purchased headphones for the children to use during the NAPLAN tests. These will be used during class sessions and beyond NAPLAN.

Headphones serve two vital purposes:

- 1. To block out the ambient noise during the tests
- 2. Some of the items on the tests have audio accompanying the questions and students need to listen for the prompts

#### Wellbeing

At Holy Rosary School all children and families are expected to be Wellbeing Warriors who look after the safety and wellbeing of themselves and others

#### Mental Health in Primary Schools Project (MHiPS)

Did you know that over 8 percent of children aged 4-11 years have a diagnosed mental health disorder, and 20 percent of children experience mental health difficulties that impact their daily functioning? Mental health and wellbeing in primary school-aged children is particularly complex, as it can be difficult to differentiate behaviours and emotions that are developmentally appropriate from those that require additional support.

In 2019, the Victorian Royal Commission into Mental Health explored and analysed how Victoria's mental health system could effectively prevent mental illness, and deliver treatment, care and support to all Victorian children. A strong theme emerging from the Royal Commission interim report, was that schools represent a key location for promoting good mental health, identifying signs and symptoms for those at risk of poor mental health, and supporting external referrals to community services for those students who require extra support.

In response to this, the Murdoch Children's Research Institute (MCRI), the University of Melbourne's Faculty of Education (FoE) and the Victorian Department of Education partnered to develop a project aimed at building the capacity of Victorian Primary Schools to support the mental health and wellbeing of their students. This year, Holy Rosary has been selected to participate in the project.

Last week, Michaela and Christine attended two days of professional development and training for MHiPS. The two days were extremely insightful and valuable. All staff will be trained throughout this year and will participate in professional learning. The aims of the project are to;

- 1. Train experienced teachers to become Mental Health Wellbeing Leaders who work to support staff in building their capability to better identify and address mental health issues as well as promotion of good mental health.
- 2. Create and strengthen a clear referral pathway model within the school and to external communitybased services, for children identified as requiring further assessment and intervention.
- 3. Use these referral pathways to make connections between the education and healthcare sectors and with community services in the early identification and management of emerging difficulties to prevent the development of subsequent mental health problems.

We will continue to update you on the progress of our professional learning and training for MHiPS as the year continues. If you would like to read more about MHiPS, you can find information on their website - <u>https://www.mhips.org.au/</u>

#### **Around the Classrooms**


This week we will be following the Year 1/2 students and their learning.


#### Inquiry

#### SCHOOL & PARISH REPORTS

- A new commissioning liturgy to start the 2024 school year was enjoyed by students.
- Students are embracing the 2024 school theme 'Love in Action', with student-led 'shout outs' under this theme to be introduced shortly.
- A grant application with the State Government to fund building works is pending.
- An independent contractor has been appointed for the roof project.
- 2024 student enrolments are down on 2023. Focus on marketing will increase.
- The Parish-owned property at 24 Gower St has been privately rented.
- Mass times for the Easter period will be published on the Parish website.

#### LEARNING UPDATE

For the past two years, Maria has helped teachers deliver a MACS co-facilitated Intensive Partnership in Writing programme, which is yielding excellent results. Sarah has also led a MACS co-facilitated Intensive Partnership in Mathematics. Unfortunately, these projects will not continue this year but the teaching frameworks and learning will long continue.

#### NEW BUSINESS

- Council membership: Leona is at the end of her three-year term and will retire. Laura will start a new three-year term. All other members will continue their terms.
- EOIs are now open for two new members on the Council. (See separate notice.)
- The Council can no longer organise working bees. New OHS guidelines are too onerous.
- Teachers will consider a parent-led initiative for students to take part in inter school netball and table tennis competitions.
- A project researching the mertis of introducing homework at Holy Rosary, including helping the transition to high school, found no overwhelming evidence in its favour. To assist families wanting to initiate learning at home, Maria will host 'learning at home' sessions for parents, starting with Preps. More info will be shared shortly.
- With the 2023 Family Fun Day raising more money than expected, the school can embark on updating the lower playground, not just replacing the turf (which was the original plan). Quotes are being sought to update the playground. Watch this space.

# SCHOOL ADVISORY COUNCIL EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST 2024

#### The School Advisory Council is seeking two new parent members.

The Council seeks parents with a range of diverse skill sets to best advise the principal under its Vision and Purpose.

VISION: To enable exceptional learning and wellbeing experiences for the Holy Rosary Community. PURPOSE: Continually improve the tools, spaces and programs that create a passion for learning and nurture connected children and families.

At present, the Council would benefit from having members with skills in marketing and building and construction, although it welcomes interest from people outside of these areas of expertise as well.
